ALUMNI PROFILE: JON GERSHINSON



An Old Westcliffian (1975 to 1982), a Governor at Westcliff High School for Boys since 2004 and current Chair of Governors elected in 2016, Jon is a Fellow of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors. His career in property consultancy has been varied during his 34 years in the profession. He trained at a small firm in London's West End, starting as an office junior then moving to dealing with flat sales, office lettings, rating and landlord and tenant work. His move to a larger firm in 1986 involved him continuing with rating and landlord and tenant work, together with a new role encompassing both commercial and

residential valuation. At the start of the long property industry recession in 1990, Jon was encouraged by banking clients to undertake property receiverships, a specialisation that he continued for a further 25 years.

In 1993 he joined Allsop & Co (now Allsop LLP), continuing in a valuation and property receivership role. Invited to join the equity partnership in 1997, he became Managing Partner in 2006, a role he held for seven years. Jon retired from the Allsop partnership in 2015 although remains a Consultant to the Firm and advises other clients whilst working from home.

Jon is best known within the property industry for his receivership expertise and for growing the Allsop team to be the market leader during the last recession. He acted as Receiver for many UK and overseas financial institutions, dealing with thousands of properties. These ranged from very low value residential and commercial units up to some of the most expensive

and highest profile casualties of the recession including the former In and Out Club in Piccadilly, London. Elected as a Fellow of the RICS in 1995, Jon was also the instigator and founding Chairman of the RICS/Insolvency Practitioners Association/ACCA Joint Registration Committee, the only professional body responsible for regulating property receivers.

An avid Essex County Cricket Club supporter and life member, Jon lives in Leigh with his wife Helen. They have two sons who have attended or are current students at WHSB. The eldest left Year 13 in 2011 and their younger son is presently in Year 9.

SCHOOL NEWS: WHSB WELCOMES HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF GLOUCESTER TO OFFICIALLY OPEN THE NEW SIXTH FORM BUILDING

Pupils and staff at Westcliff High School for Boys were delighted to welcome HRH The Duke of Gloucester to the School on Thursday 11 May 2017 to officially open the School's new Sixth Form Building.

The building, partly funded by a grant from the Education and Skills Funding Agency, cost £3.2m to construct and has created a modern space allowing students to study in an environment that prepares them for university. The building includes two state-of-the-art Science laboratories, four new classrooms, a computer suite and study area, a café and a large multipurpose area, all of which the students have found very beneficial.

Dr Anton Machacek, Director of Sixth Form Studies, said of the building "The classrooms are ideal for Sixth Form teaching. A bright, modern, well-aired and well-lit environment lends itself to lively discussion and to sustained concentration."

Students themselves are equally taken with the opportunities the new facilities have given them, with Year 13 student Monty Clark commenting on the "tasty food and sociable atmosphere of the Café" and noting that "the peaceful Study Area allows me to get my head down but also get help from my peers when a difficult question arises."

His Royal Highness spoke to pupils and staff, and members of the Parents' Association and Old Westcliffian Association. The Duke also had the opportunity to see Year 9 and Year 12 pupils perform Science experiments in the School's newly-refurbished



Science Building before meeting with some of the School's finest Art students and members of the Combined Cadet Force (CCF). His Royal Highness also met the design team behind the project and the Sixth Form Pastoral Team.

As part of the celebration guests to the School were treated to a number of displays from talented students, including poetry performances from Shakespeare's King Lear and Henry V, musical pieces by Bach, a debating display, and an excerpt from Kit Marlowe's play Dr Faustus, before His Royal Highness unveiled a plaque celebrating the opening of the building. Speaking after the event, Headmaster, Mr Mike Skelly, said "We would like to thank His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester for visiting the School on this special occasion to open our fantastic new Sixth Form Building. We are delighted with the facility that we now have available and were pleased that His Royal Highness was able to celebrate with us."

OWA ANNUAL REUNION DINNER 2017

This year's OWA Annual Reunion Dinner is on Friday 8 September 2017. The event promises to be, as always, an extremely enjoyable evening with fine food and reminiscing. SUCCESS IN 'PROGRESS 8' LEAGUE TABLES

In January 2017, league tables for more than 5,000 secondary schools across the country were published by the Department for Education based on the results for exams taken in the summer of 2016.

This year the Government also introduced Progress 8, an indicator which shows how a school is performing nationally in terms of measuring students' progress in eight core subjects from primary school to secondary. Whilst the process

of calculating Progress 8 is rather complex, the main point to note is that a minus score (below 0) means a school is performing below the national average, a neutral score (0) means a school is performing at the national average, and a positive score (above 0) means the school is performing above the national average. The higher or lower the score, the better or worse the school is performing.

Measuring Westcliff High School for Boys' performance at GCSE in 2016 using the "Progress 8 Score", the School managed to achieve the highest score in the Southend Borough with a point score of 0.66.

ALUMNI IN THE NEWS: KEVIN O'NEILL

Kevin O'Neill, Head of Neurosurgery at Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust in London and Old Westcliffian (1974 to 1981), appeared in the BBC documentary series 'Hospital' broadcast in January this year. The programme in which Kevin – one of the country's leading brain surgeons – and his colleagues appeared saw them deal with some of the country's most complex and challenging neurological cases.



ALUMNI IN THE NEWS: PROF TONY GERSHLICK

In February this year Professor Tony Gershlick, a Consultant Cardiologist and Old Westcliffian (1963 to 1970), was given a lifetime achievement award by a leading cardiology institution. Prof Gershlick, who grew up in Westcliff, said how it was a "true



honour" to receive the inaugural British Cardiovascular Intervention Society Lifetime Achievement Career Award in recognition of his contribution to the field.

Prof Gershlick, who is now a Consultant Cardiologist and Professor of Interventional Cardiology in Leicester, acknowledged the importance of a strong start to education, praising the School. He said "I thought this was an excellent opportunity to show how important early education is. I had a fantastic start to academia at Westcliff High School for Boys and I am very grateful for that." Prof Gershlick has been involved in coronary intervention since the mid-Eighties

and still remains active clinically, being on-call for patients with heart attacks and having a full clinical practice.

He has been involved in practicechanging research, conceiving, initiating and running four major national and international trials that have changed the way patients are treated and which have been incorporated into international guidelines for doctors.

Of his award, he said: "This is indeed a true honour and my sincere thanks go to the British Cardiovascular Intervention Society and to all those who have supported me in trying to make a difference."

ALUMNI DONATION TO THE GEOLOGY DEPARTMENT

We are extremely grateful to a member of our Alumni Community who recently donated a verv generous sum of money in recognition of the enjoyable and worthwhile contribution made to his own education and those of many others by Head of Geology at the School, Mr Nick Cooper. With the sum of money, the Geology Department has been able to purchase a beautiful and varied collection of minerals, rocks and fossils which are now on permanent display near the front entrance of the School for the benefit of the whole School community.

The Old Westcliffian, who wishes to remain anonymous, suggested that the exhibit be named the "Nick Cooper Mineral and Fossil Collection", in recognition of the fact that Mr Cooper has taught the subject at the



School for many years. The collection has already provoked much thought amongst parents, staff, students and visitors to the School.

Geology has been taught at Westcliff since 1976 when 'O' Level Geology was introduced and 1978 when A-Level Geology commenced. Since then GCSE and A-Level Geology have been taught uninterrupted through to the present day. Central to the teaching of Geology, and well known to many Old Westcliffians, have been the Year 10 Field Courses to Swanage, Dorset (since 1977) and the Year 12 Field Courses to Dyfed (1979 to 1987) and Isle of Arran (1987 to the present day). Such field courses have helped inspire many Old Westcliffians to study the

subject at University and pursue a geology career within such industries as oil and gas, mineral and rock, mining and engineering and environmental geology. Such vital industries provoke an interesting saying about the importance of Geology as a subject: "What we do not grow or hunt for, we must take from the Earth".

In the last twelve months, the Geology Department has prioritised the development of technology. Recent developments have included the School's own seismograph which can record earthquakes from all over the world. This was supported financially by the British Geological Society (BGS) and interesting results are often displayed on the School's website and

social media feeds. Also, the Geology Department has its own Twitter account (@WHSBGeology).

In the near future we hope to provide an opportunity for Old Westcliffian Geologists to link up with each other for the purposes of job and course opportunities, advice, social links and more. The School hopes that Old Westcliffian Geologists working within the industry might also be willing to provide advice to current students and perhaps contribute to the Westcliff Geology Conference held in December each year. ALUMNI DONATION TO THE DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

We are very grateful to the family of Robert Marshall, Old Westcliffian (1948 to 1954), for visiting the School earlier this year on Robert's behalf and donating to the Design & Technology Department original patent documentation belonging to Robert.

Robert, who now lives in the USA, left the UK in 1963 to work for the Institute of Technology in Chicago during the 1960's 'Brain Drain' (a term adopted in the 1960s in the context of concerns within the UK that the country was losing skilled scientific and engineering personnel to other countries, notably the USA). The headline of an article about Robert and his family leaving for the USA in the Southend Standard in June 1963 stated "Eastwood man sails off so more scientific 'brains' lost to America".

Robert was born in 1937 and attended Eastwood Junior School before joining Westcliff High School for Boys. After leaving Westcliff in in 1954 Robert commenced his technical education at Southend Technical College. His first research position was with the A.W.R.E. on Foulness Island and,

until leaving for America, he was engaged on research work at the A.E.I. laboratories in Harlow. After obtaining his Ph.D in the United States he spent many years in the electronics industry working on items that have significantly changed the way people

live today such as the modern day use of barcoding and the development of the first texting pager. Following retirement Robert became a specialist witness in many large electronic patent violation cases.
