I am delighted to welcome you to the fifth edition of the WHSB Alumni Network Newsletter.

It is two years since the launch of the School's Community Development Office (CDO) in 2016, and I am pleased to report excellent progress in terms of extending the School's connections with our local community and primary schools. WHSB has been at the forefront of a drive to encourage more local children to attend the grammar schools and we have seen an improvement in admissions of local children as a result of our work.


ALUMNI PROFILE: ANUJ PATEL

Old Westcliffian (2010 to 2017), former School Captain (2016-2017), WHSB CCF Company Sergeant Major (2016-2017) and Charity Week Chairperson (2015-2016), Anuj Patel is in his first year at Trinity College Cambridge studying for a BA (Hons) in Economics.

Anuj is involved in a number of Cambridge University societies including the Cambridge University Finance and Investment Society (CUFIS) and the "Marshall Society", Cambridge University's worldrenowned Economics Society.

Having been a keen musician at WHSB, playing in the Sinfonia, Big Band, Concert Band and Choir, Anuj has joined a variety of musical groups in Cambridge. He continues to play the violin in string ensembles and the saxophone and bass in jazz bands. Anuj is currently exploring the career options available to him post-graduation. WHSB CENTENARY: THE SCHOOL'S EARLY BEGINNINGS

The First World War had ended in victory, peace had returned and with it, prosperity. From 1918 onwards and into the early 1920s, Southend saw a period of considerable growth. The County Borough's boundaries expanded to take in Leigh, with the Highlands and Marine Estates being established.

In 1919, as a result of the town's expansion and growing population, Southend's Education Committee decided a new Intermediate School was needed for boys and girls. "Belsfield" at 110 Victoria Avenue, a large house on a two-acre site, was purchased at a cost of £7.000 (the equivalent of £350,000 today). "Belsfield" had previously been owned by Thomas Brown, a director of the "Westcliff-on-Sea Motor Char-a-banc Company" (later Westcliff-on-Sea Motor Services). Mr Brown's company founded the town's first motorbus service which ran between Southend High Street and Hamlet Court Road in Westcliff. This motorbus service commenced on 19 July 1920 with the route numbered 1, the designation still in use today.

Following the acquisition of the

Victoria Avenue site (seen below in the early 1960's) and the building being made ready for its new use as an educational establishment, "The Commercial Secondary School", as Westcliff High School was first known, opened on 27 April 1920 with 109 pupils (boys and girls) on the register. 1920 was a significant year for the town: Priory Park was officially opened by H.R.H, The Duke of York (later King George VI); Southend's War Memorial designed by Edward Lutyens (who was also responsible for the Cenotaph in Whitehall) was erected on Clifftown Parade: and the Royal Naval & Military Club in Royal Terrace opened its doors for the first time as a place for First World War veterans and their families to socialise and support each other following their experiences in the 'Great War'.

In August 1921, the school changed its name from "The Commercial School" to "Westcliff High School" (the original title having been somewhat confusing). By 1922, 372 children were on the School's roll and it was rapidly outgrowing its original site. Plans were, by this time, well underway to relocate to new, larger and purposebuilt premises to the west of the



town. Westcliff High School for Boys in Kenilworth Gardens was officially opened in 1926 for 850 pupils to attend. The Girls School remained in Victoria Avenue until 1931. The School's original "Belsfield" site, which was adjacent to the Civic buildings in Victoria Avenue, was demolished in 1964 (it can still be seen in front of the Southend Technical College in the photograph below taken during the construction of the new Civic Centre).



If any members of our Alumni Community can shed light on what the original "Belsfield" Victoria Avenue site was used for following the Girls' School move in 1931 and its demolition in 1964 we would be delighted to hear from you. As the premises belonged to the County Borough of Southend we understand they may have been used as an annexe for the Southend Municipal College, its main building being located a short distance away at Victoria Circus, for students studying at night school. SUCCESS IN SUNDAY TIMES 2018 GOOD SCHOOLS GUIDE



Set in a 1920s style speakeasy, the evening will also offer the opportunity to listen to the very best of Westcliff musicians as the Bigger Band takes to the stage. Tickets are priced at £10 for adults and £8 for pupils.

A rather sinister trip to a Parisian cemetery follows for the Orchestra to join Death himself as he wakes the spirit world with his solo violin in Saint-Saen's Danse Macabre. The tour ends with a jaunt to the Big Apple for Gershwin's exciting and jazzy Rhapsody in Blue, a work that never fails to evoke the bustle and bluster of New York City at the beginning of the 20th century.
