This project would not have been possible were it not for the legacy of Old Westcliffian, Barry Coker, whose generous support will enrich the experience of sports teaching and training for pupils at WHSB for many years to come. This is a facility which benefits nearly every pupil attending the School, as it not only provides a training resource for our top athletes, but is also used for teaching during timetabled Physical Education lessons.

Replacing and upgrading facilities at the School is becoming more challenging and many projects are having to be put on hold due to declining funding in the Education sector. Mr Rothon, our Director of Finance and Accounting, has included within this edition some information on how Old Westcliffians, parents, and friends of the School can help us to plug gaps in funding through donations and support. In recent years we have made provision to upgrade the School Hall, and much of the redecoration was carried out last year. During the summer break, we have been able to progress that work with the fitting of the new stage and surrounding curtains. Speech Day 2026



Baroness (Sally) Morgan of Huyton

This year, our annual Speech Day will take place on Thursday 5 November, allowing us to celebrate the outstanding achievements of pupils across the School during the last academic year. As in previous years, the evening is a compulsory attendance for all students in Year 11, and the Lower and Upper Sixth, those students also being important role models for our younger pupils. We generally welcome more than 900 pupils, parents, staff and other guests to the School for this formal occasion.

Our Guest of Honour for Speech Day this year will be Baroness Morgan of Huyton. Baroness (Sally) Morgan became Fitzwilliam College's ninth Master on 1 October 2019.

Baroness Morgan grew up in Liverpool, and later studied Geography at Durham University, a PGCE at King's College London (KCL), and a part time MA in Education at the then Institute of Education. A former teacher, she has always been involved in education and, since 2005, has been Chair or advisor to a range of educational charities aiming at raising educational aspirations. She is a Visiting Professor at KCL, sits on the

University Council, and is Chair of The Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust.

From 1997 to 2005, Baroness Morgan was Director of Political and Government Relations in 10 Downing Street, and became a peer in 2001, serving as Minister for Women and Equalities in the Cabinet Office. She was a member of the Olympic Delivery Authority Board for the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games, is a former Chair of Ofsted, and Vice-Chair at King's College London.

We look forward to welcoming Baroness Sally Morgan to Westcliff High School for Boys in November, and to celebrating our pupils' achievements.

Staff Changes in September 2026

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those staff members who left us in August for their dedicated service to the School.

Mr Barrett, one of our longest-serving peripatetic music teachers, inspired and supported his pupils superbly throughout his time with us. He also trained and led our Junior Jazz Ensemble for many years, enabling them to deliver outstanding performances at our Christmas and Summer Big Band Concerts.

Mrs Benett, a highly experienced and talented teacher, has contributed significantly to the Modern Foreign Languages Department during her year with us, particularly through her effective use of new technologies. We thank her sincerely for her work and wish her well in all future endeavours.

Mr Chanut joined us in 2022 as a Modern Foreign Languages Assistant and quickly impressed with his excellent subject knowledge and infectious positivity. He also made a valuable contribution to our Sixth Form pastoral system, supporting students as they navigated various challenges. Having now secured a place to train as a pilot, we wish him every success in his new career.

Mrs Allard has served the School for six academic years. Initially appointed as a teacher of Art, she stepped up to the role of Head of Art in September 2023, and under her leadership the department has continued to flourish. She also contributed strongly to the Sixth Form pastoral system as a Progress Leader. Many will also know her for her outstanding leadership as Officer Commanding the Army Section of our CCF. We wish her well in her new position at another high-performing school.

Mr Wright joined us as Head of Technology in 2017 and invested enormous energy and vision into developing our Design and Technology Department into one of the finest in the area. He has championed student engagement in national and regional competitions and enrichment programmes, enabling pupils to achieve a number of prestigious awards. Mr Wright now takes up a promoted post, joining the Senior Leadership Team of another local school, and we wish him every success.

Mr Derrick has served the School for 13 years as a highly successful Director of Music. A talented musician, he has provided tremendous leadership to the Music Department. Under his baton, ensembles such as the Symphonia and Big Band have grown in skill and confidence as he introduced ever more challenging repertoire. As a senior teacher, he played a key role through his support with the development of our Life-Long Readers Programme and promoting reading through assemblies. He also enriched the cultural life of the School through numerous trips and activities. He now moves to Scotland to become Head of Arts at another school, and we wish him well.

Mr Cunneen joined the School in 2009 and has built the Economics Department into one of the largest and most successful in the School. He is a teacher held in the highest regard by his students, with superb subject knowledge that has inspired many to pursue Economics at university, and making it one of the most popular degree choices among WHSB pupils. Under his leadership, innovations such as the Economics Society and a student-led Economics magazine have flourished. Mr Cunneen has now retired from teaching, and we wish him a long, happy, and healthy retirement.

We are pleased to welcome a number of new staff to the School this Autumn Term. Mrs Shaw joins us as our new Head of Art, bringing extensive experience and expertise to the department. We also welcome Mr Stuttle, who will teach Economics and Mathematics and work closely with Mr M North, our new Head of Economics following Mr Cunneen's retirement. Mr Hawthorne joins the Mathematics Department, and Mr De Bettencourt joins the Modern Foreign Languages Department and we are pleased to welcome them too. We are delighted to welcome back Mrs Machacek to the School (Music Department), where she will work closely with our newly promoted Director of Music, Mr Wood. In addition, we welcome Mr Reeves, a highly experienced teacher, to the Design and Technology Department.

I would also like to formally record our welcome to staff who joined us earlier in the year: Miss Korbe, who became a Science Technician in January; Miss Ray-Smith, who joined us as a Cover Supervisor; Mr E Griffiths (an Old Westcliffian), who joined as an Administrative Assistant in February; Mr D Griffiths, who became one of our Sixth Form Supervisors in June; and Ms Lambert, who joined us in March as our Premises and Facilities Manager.

We are delighted to celebrate Mr Muir's achievement in completing his Level 3 ICT Apprenticeship. During the course of Mr Muir's apprenticeship, he has developed associated skills in a wide range of areas, and has supported staff and pupils in resolving technical issues and maintaining ICT systems. His apprenticeship journey has included some challenges including time away due to illness, and we congratulate him on his continued commitment to his training despite those challenges. CELEBRATING GCSE AND A LEVEL RESULTS IN 2026

Congratulations to students in our GCSE and A Level cohorts this year as we are celebrating another year of exceptional results.

At A Level, half of all entries were awarded the highest grades of A* or A. An outstanding 19% of all A Levels were awarded the top grade of A*, while an impressive 50% of grades achieved were A* or A. Furthermore, 76% of all grades were awarded at A*, A or B, underlining the continued academic excellence achieved by the School's Sixth Form students.

These superb results mean that the overwhelming majority of students are now progressing to courses at some of the country's most prestigious Russell Group universities, including Oxford and Cambridge, as well as degree apprenticeship programmes with major national and international organisations. The students will be pursuing a wide range of courses, including Medicine, Economics, Engineering, Computer Science, Music, and Law.

There were many outstanding individual achievements. 36% of students achieved A* and A grades across all their subjects, while thirteen students secured three or more A* grades. Among them were Varun Ayyappan, Jess Bates, Joseph Galvin, Daniel Gocher and Eleanor Jarrett who achieved an exceptional four A* grades.

Alongside these remarkable successes, many more students are celebrating having achieved the grades required to secure places at their first-choice universities.

Students taking GCSEs this year had much to celebrate too, having also achieved an outstanding set of GCSE results. Their results were amongst the School's best ever, with 55% of all grades at 9-8, and 74% of all grades at 9-7. A remarkable 29% of all GCSE examinations received the top grade – grade 9.

The exceptional GCSE results meant there were many outstanding performances by individual pupils. 66% of pupils achieved 8 or more 9-7 grades, and 27% of pupils achieved 12 9-7 grades. An incredible 48% of pupils achieved 8 or more 9-8 grades. A remarkable 9 pupils achieved an astonishing 11 grade 9s, with Lennon Jacobs and Daniel Kirby achieving an incredible 12 grade 9s.

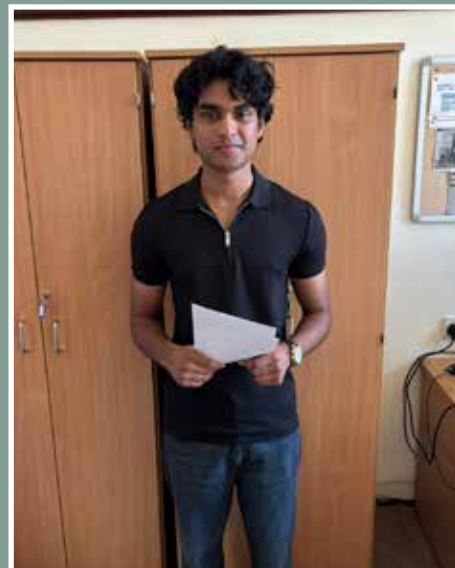
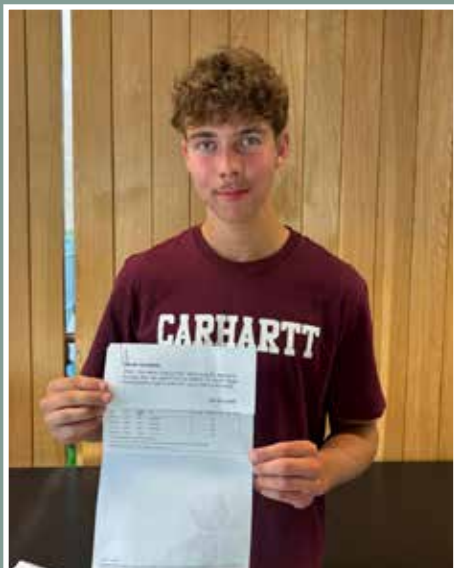

We wish all the students every success as they take the next steps in their education, training, and future careers.

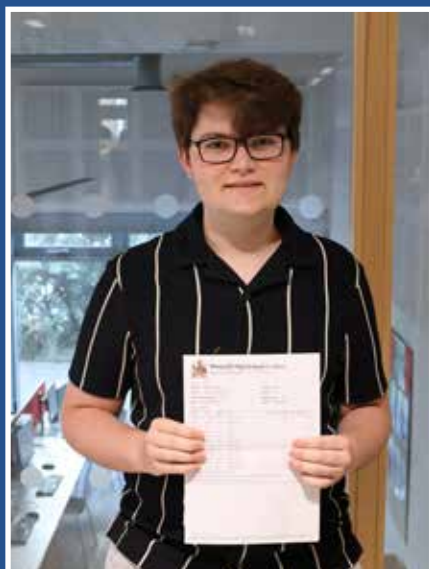

Top Tips

1) Make Friends: This is especially important as you can revise and help each other. You might have not fitted in in your previous school, so this is your restart button to have a better time.

2) Homework: Follow your Homework timetable and make sure you do not

forget your homework at home - nor should you rush it. You put work into the 11+ so make the work your norm!

3) Revision: Revise using your homework timetable. If you do not get the homework slotted for that day, just revise a topic on that subject. Make a revision timetable - this will be beneficial for your end-of-year examinations. I know revision can be hard to settle down to sometimes but persevere and do it. A good quote is "Fail to prepare, prepare to fail."

4) Be kind: Be kind to members of staff as they only want to help. Do not be rude but try to be helpful and respectful. Treat your classmates the same way too.

5) Organisation: Make sure you are organised - do not forget stuff, try not to forget to do things, and make sure you are on time at lessons. Make sure at break you leave the playground at the right time to get to your classroom.

6) Conduct Cards and Detentions: Make sure you do everything properly, have the correct uniform. One conduct card signature is not the end of the world but once you reach two or three you might want to be careful. SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT AND FUNDRAISING

The Westcliff Diary routinely references the wide range of deeply enriching activities, both curricular and extra-curricular, that are offered to WHSB pupils, and which they engage in, in large numbers. The School has always considered this wide offer as integral to its mission of developing both intellect and character in each of our young people, as represented by our Learner Profile.

It is important that we understand that financing such activities, in particular extracurricular provision, presents an ever-deepening challenge.

Government funding for schools has been reducing in real terms across a number of years, making it increasingly necessary for schools to seek alternative sources of income. As a selective grammar school, WHSB is being hit especially hard by these real-terms funding reductions. We receive the absolute minimum funding per pupil allowed under government funding guidelines, so we fare poorly compared to the majority of state schools. Funding allocations announced for 2026/27 have been extremely hard on us.

In the current funding environment, without significant financial support from the School community (parents, Old Westcliffians, and other friends of the School) offering such a varied programme of activities to pupils will no longer be possible

In recent years, the School has taken steps to promote ways in which the wider School community can assist in generating funds, but regrettably the response has been disappointing and we need your support.

Donation to the Pupil Fund

The School should like to thank all those parents and others who have previously donated or continue to donate to the School's Pupil Fund. The number of parents and friends of the School donating has, I am sorry to say, reduced quite considerably in recent years, and we are keen to revive it. As well as funding equipment for classrooms and laboratories, books for the Library, the Pupil Fund has, over the years, supported activities and pursuits including Engineering, Computing, Sport, Music, Drama, and the School's Combined Cadet Force. Donating to the Pupil Fund is a straightforward way of making a one-off, or (we hope) a regular, general contribution towards these enriching activities. ENRICHMENT DAY FRIDAY 18 SEPTEMBER

Friday 18 September 2026

A day spent away from the timetable, visiting a new place or revisiting a centre of particular interest, debating a moral dilemma, or rehearsing a scene for a Languages play, might look on the surface like a day of lost learning. In practice, it is often one of the most valuable days in a student's School Year. Enrichment Days, whether built around the Arts, Sport, Outdoor Learning, Science investigations, or community projects, give students something the standard curriculum often cannot - room to explore an interest without the pressure of assessment hanging over it. Freed from the constraints of the classroom, students frequently engage more deeply, ask more questions, and take more risks with their thinking than they might sometimes do in a conventional classroom lesson. A single day of Enrichment can also build resilience, teamwork, communication, and creativity - navigating a problem-solving challenge with different classmates is practising negotiation and compromise;

performing in front of an audience for the first time is learning to manage nerves and project confidence. These are transferable skills that students carry into every other area of School life, and later into work and adult relationships.

This is why we put so much store in our biannual Enrichment Days, organised to provide students with opportunities both within and beyond the School walls, and why we are so grateful to the staff for organising and supporting these wonderful alternative educational opportunities for our fantastic and capable students. Some will head off for trips to Duxford, Sizewell, Nuclear Races, or Pottery making, while others will stay at School to explore options in Medicine, aspects of Science, and careers in Journalism and the Humanities. Whatever they do, we strongly encourage all students to embrace the opportunities provided and hope they are able to enjoy to the full a different day and a different way of learning.

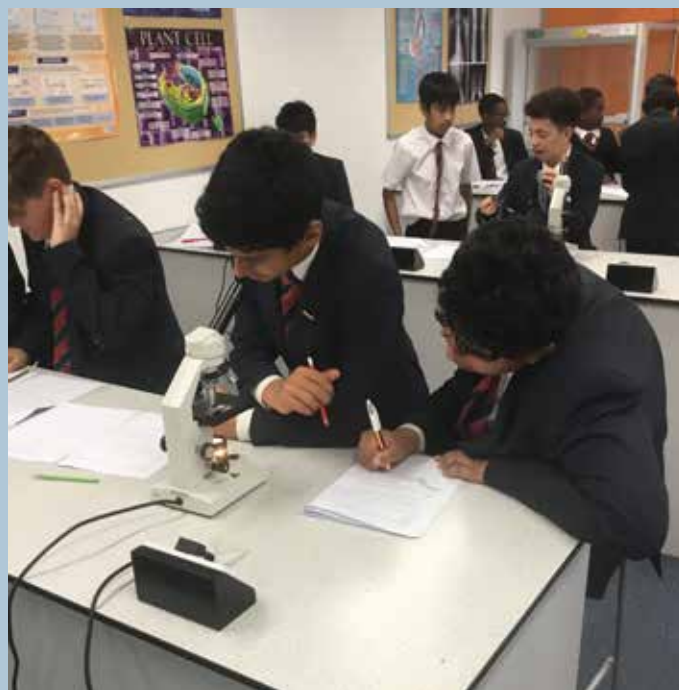
ENRICHMENT DAY FRIDAY 18 SEPTEMBER

YEAR 8: FORENSICS DAY

Our Year 8 pupils are set to become forensic investigators during an exciting Future Forensics Day, where science, problem-solving, and teamwork come together to provide a hands-on learning experience. Throughout the day, Forensics Access Limited will encourage pupils to step into the role of a forensic scientist, discovering how scientific techniques are used to investigate crime scenes, analyse evidence, and uncover the truth. Working in teams, pupils will tackle a series of engaging experiments and practical challenges designed to replicate real forensic investigations.

Pupils will have the opportunity to examine evidence, record observations, test hypotheses, and present their findings, developing along the way an understanding of the skills and methods used by professionals working in forensic science. Alongside the scientific activities, the day has been carefully designed to develop three of our designated soft skills:

- Teamwork – collaborating effectively to solve complex investigations and share ideas;
- Communication – discussing evidence, explaining conclusions, and presenting findings clearly;
- Time Management – planning tasks, prioritising investigations, and working efficiently within set time limits.



Future Forensics Day offers far more than an introduction to forensic science. It encourages curiosity, critical thinking, and resilience while helping pupils build essential life skills that will support them across all areas of learning and future careers. We look forward to seeing all our Year 8 pupils embrace the challenge, think like forensic scientists, and put their investigative skills to the test in what promises to be an engaging, educational, and memorable day.

YEAR 9: TRIP TO IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM DUXFORD

Our annual visit to the airfield and aircraft collection at Duxford, near Cambridge, is always an exciting enrichment opportunity for our Year 9 cohort of pupils, and we look forward to our return this term. Forming part of the Imperial War Museum, the exhibition spaces at Duxford are evolving from an arrangement around themes to one of periods of history, which will integrate better the historical and technological context of the aircraft. It also brings the aircraft together with the land warfare exhibits of the Royal Anglian Regiment Museum, following the closure of the Land Warfare building, and the stories of some of the people and events of the Second World War.

Static exhibits include several Spitfires, some of which are air-worthy, alongside its nemesis the Messerschmitt Bf-109, Concorde pre-production MSN 101 with its flight-test equipment still installed, and other more modern aircraft and helicopters: Avro Vulcan and York, Shorts Sunderland, English Electric Lightning, Hawker Hunter, Westland Wessex, and Sea King. The American museum includes fighters and bombers, A10 strike aircraft, and the Lockheed SR71 Blackbird reconnaissance plane, alongside a B-52 bomber. Pupils will learn to appreciate too that the airfield and buildings themselves are also exhibits.



On previous visits, we have been treated to flying displays by Spitfires and the Hispano-Suiza-manufactured Messerschmitt Bf 109 kept at Duxford, a Yakovlev display team, and a take-off by the resident Boeing B-17 “Flying Fortress”, the only airworthy example remaining in Europe. In 2023, there was a large number of Second World War aircraft flying in preparation for the Battle of Britain Day celebrations. We hope to see similar aircraft movements this year, along with aircraft maintenance and restoration projects in progress. We are grateful to the Imperial War Museum, who make available this type of opportunity to school groups free of charge.

YEAR 10: HUMANITIES DAY



This September, our School's very own reporting outlet – WHSBBC News – returns once again to the crucible of journalism that is the Humanities Enrichment Day.

American author Andrew Vacch's words immediately sprang to mind when planning the English Department's Enrichment Day this year: "journalism is what maintains democracy." In the current political climate, it is more important than ever for our pupils to be globally aware and effective communicators, and we intend on achieving just that.

Following on from the stimulating political and rhetorical works at the centre of our Key Stage 3 English education, pupils in Year 10 will now have the chance to put their own non-fiction skills to the test in order to persuade and inform their audience. Pupils will rotate between activities that centre around current affairs, philosophical debate, and masterclasses in how to craft the written word. At the end of the day, pupils will get the chance then to 'report' on their findings in the next instalment of the WHSBBC News.

The day will offer Year 10 pupils an opportunity to practice their GCSE Language skills, as well as encouraging them to read non-fiction and works of journalism fastidiously, perhaps even considering their own future in journalism so that they go on to maintain our democracy in their own words.

YEAR 11 AND UPPER SIXTH: TRIP TO NUCLEAR RACES

In September, students in Year 11 and the Upper Sixth are invited to take part in our exciting Enrichment Day at Nuclear Races, where students will challenge themselves through a series of demanding obstacles designed to test their determination, resilience, and teamwork.

Throughout the day, participants will face a variety of obstacles, including climbing walls, crawling tunnels, rope challenges, and water-filled ditches. With plenty of mud expected along the route, participants will need to be prepared to get completely covered from head to toe!

At the end of the day, students will leave with a great sense of achievement, having successfully completed one of the UK's most exciting obstacle race experiences. The Nuclear Races trip promises to be a fantastic day of adventure, teamwork, and fun, and we look forward to hearing all about their muddy exploits when they return.

YEAR 11: PUZZLES AND PROBLEMS

Year 11 pupils who are not taking part in the Nuclear Races trip will remain in school for a special "Puzzles and Problems" Day. This is designed to develop pupils' mathematical thinking, reasoning, and problem-solving skills through a variety of engaging activities and challenges. Pupils will have the opportunity to work collaboratively, sharing ideas and strategies as they tackle a range of stimulating mathematical tasks.

Throughout the day, pupils will work in teams to solve different mathematical problem-solving challenges, including difficult GCSE-style questions and problems taken from the prestigious UKMT Maths Challenge. These activities will encourage perseverance, logical thinking, and effective communication, helping pupils to build confidence in approaching unfamiliar and demanding mathematical problems while enjoying the challenge of working together with their peers.

LOWER SIXTH: TRIP TO SIZEWELL

On Friday 18 September, Physics students in the Lower Sixth will have the opportunity to explore one of the UK's most significant pieces of energy infrastructure: Sizewell B, the country's only commercial Pressurised Water Reactor.

This remarkable facility operates with around 20 m³ of water rushing through its reactor core every second, heated to roughly 300 °C. To keep the coolant in its liquid state at such extreme temperatures, the system is maintained at a pressure about 160 times greater than that of the atmosphere. Sizewell B contributes nearly 1.2 trillion watts of electricity to the National Grid (enough to supply around 2.3 million homes) and accounts for approximately 3% of the UK's total energy demand. Impressively, all nuclear waste produced since the station began operating

remains stored on site, and by the end of its planned lifetime in 2035, the total volume of spent fuel is expected to be just 1,500 tonnes.

During the visit, students will be guided through several key areas of the power station. Highlights include the building that houses the spent fuel pool, the filtration systems that protect the station's water circuits from North Sea wildlife, and the vast turbine hall, where four enormous turbines spin at 3000 rpm.

As nuclear power forms an important part of the A Level Physics curriculum, this trip offers a valuable chance for students to connect their classroom learning with real-world engineering on an industrial scale.

In the 'Learn & Lunch' sessions, students will be introduced to the cobblestone glazing technique which they will apply to various designs and colours of their choosing. These will be fired at the kilns and students will be able to collect these from school in the following weeks.

Those students who attended last year were highly positive about the day, which will focus on mindfulness, stress-relieving, and creative outlets for expressing emotions amidst the hustle

and bustle of their public examination year at WHSB. Students learn about mindfulness and mental wellness in the PSHEE curriculum, and this activity will provide a chance for participants to put those lessons into action.

Refreshments and a freshly prepared hot buffet lunch will be provided and are included in the cost of the trip; students with any dietary requirements are asked to make me aware of these in advance so the venue is aware. The coach will depart from WHSB after the start of the School day and arrive back in time for the end of the School day. This is likely to be a popular option with our Upper Sixth students so we ask that any students who are interested confirm their place as soon as possible.

UPPER SIXTH MEDICINE, DENTISTRY, AND VETERINARY MEDICINE MOCK INTERVIEWS

Friday 18th September 2026 and Wednesday 25th November 2026

Medicine, Dentistry, and Veterinary Medicine (MDV) continue to be among the most popular university course choices for our Sixth Form students. Given the highly competitive nature of admissions to these courses, the School offers a comprehensive support programme for all aspiring MDV students, mainly delivered during weekly lunchtime sessions of the MDV Society.

Feedback from our recent Upper Sixth leavers strongly encourages students aspiring to study an MDV course to attend the MDV Society meetings. Many credit the School's

MDV programme as being instrumental in supporting their applications.

A recent Upper Sixth Leaver said:

"MDV has been a very enjoyable experience for me as I have been able to interact and discuss medical topics I would not usually be able to do in day-day conversation. It has enabled me to learn more about the subject that I am so very passionate about and rekindle my motivation to study Medicine every week. I have been attending MDV since Year 9 and I now feel accustomed to the medical laws and ethics of the subject, improving my confidence and responding to sudden questions and thinking on the spot."

A key part of the MDV programme is the mock interview experience, designed to prepare students for the rigorous university interview process. This year, the mock interviews will

take place on Friday 18th September 2026, as part of Enrichment Day, and on Wednesday 25th November 2026.

These interviews are conducted by a range of professionals, including doctors, current MDV university students, and other healthcare practitioners. Students not only gain valuable practice in interview settings but also benefit from insightful conversations with the professionals about careers in healthcare. The interviews will be a mix of in-person and online, as well as panel and multiple mini-interview (MMI) style. MMI is the most common format, with students having to engage in 5-10 stations of mini-interviews, each station assessing a different skill. A recent Upper Sixth Leaver reflected on this experience and said:

"The most helpful part of MDV was the mock interviews we did, where we spent the whole day doing interviews or preparing for them. I think that is what helped with my application the most, as it gave me realistic preparation for what an actual interview would be like, and the confidence I gained carried over very well into the interviews I attended."

On Wednesday 23 September 2026, Year 11 pupils will attend an extended assembly delivered by the Safer Essex Roads Partnership as part of the award-winning Dead End road safety and young driver education programme. The Dead End programme uses educational theatre and interactive workshop elements to explore the risks associated with road use and the potentially life-changing consequences of poor decisions. Pupils will learn about the Fatal Four factors that contribute to serious road collisions: speeding, drink and drug driving, mobile phone use while driving, and failure to wear a seatbelt. The assembly will also highlight the disproportionate risks faced by young drivers and passengers, including the impact of driver inexperience and sleep deprivation. The session supports our Personal Development agenda and provides valuable preparation for pupils as they move towards greater independence and future driving responsibilities.

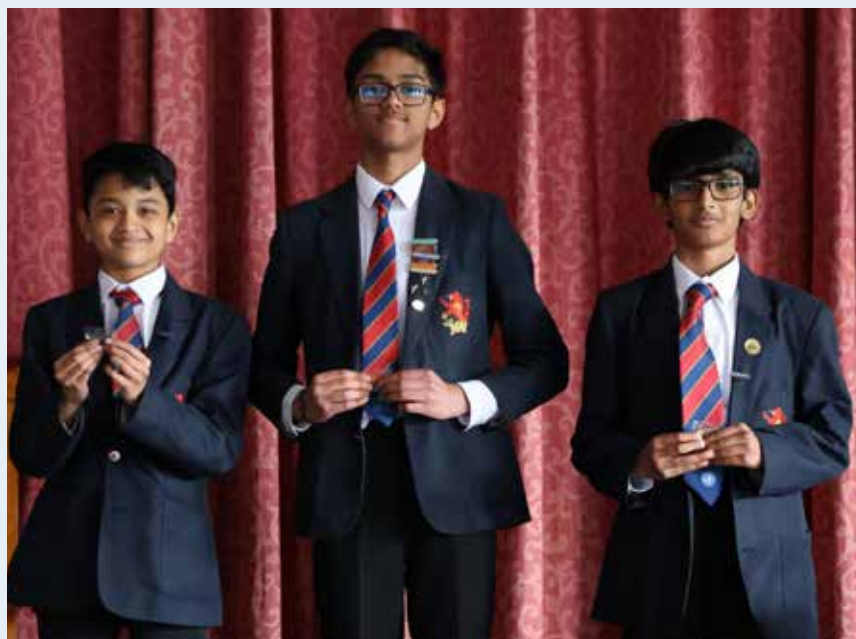
The club takes place every Monday lunchtime and has helped students build commitment and develop organisation. I plan each session and have also created my own quizzes and tests to help develop their language skills.

MFL Extra-Curricular Activities and Competitions

Latin

On Monday lunchtimes in W21, new pupils in all Year Groups are welcome to join our existing Latin scholars as we work through the excellent Cambridge Latin Course. Dr Platts takes charge of the beginners in Book I, whilst Ms McKeown works through Book II with the more advanced pupils. Latin is an excellent base for learning any of the Romance Languages – French, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Romanian, Catalan, Galician and other related languages of the Mediterranean – and also enhances pupils' advanced vocabulary in English.

Spelling Bee

In the autumn term, all Year 7 pupils take part in the Spelling Bee in both languages studied. This is a House competition organised by Mr Rayment (Head of Osprey House) and Mr Madrid (Head of Kestrel House), with winning pupils awarded House Points and prizes. It is great fun and excellent practice for learning spellings and how to say the alphabet in French, German and Spanish.

Translation Bee

At the end of the autumn term and the start of the spring term, all Year 8 pupils take part in the Translation Bee in the languages they study. Just like the Spelling Bee, this is a House competition organised by Mr Rayment and Mr Madrid, and all pupils compete in class, with the top three, four or five pupils proceeding to the finals in the Westcliff Theatre.

GCHQ

Each autumn term, Year 9 talented linguists and mathematicians are invited to compete in teams in a five-day national challenge to crack increasingly complex coding and linguistic challenges. Last year 2,734 teams competed nationally, with our top two teams Adventurous Rattlesnake and Heroic Cheetah coming 30th and 31st nationally; as well as 4th and 5th in the region, out of 260 – an outstanding achievement. Here are some of the comments from last year's competitors:

"My team and I had a lot of fun solving puzzles together and, while some did it to try and win the prize, I genuinely thought that it was great."

Foreign Language Assistants

Every year, we welcome three Foreign Language Assistants to Westcliff High School for Boys. We are extremely fortunate to be able to continue to offer this provision, because employing Foreign Language Assistants (FLAs) offers significant benefits to both pupils and schools. For pupils, FLAs provide authentic exposure to native speakers, improving pronunciation, listening skills, and confidence in speaking. They also bring cultural insights, enriching lessons with real-life perspectives on language use and traditions. This helps to increase student engagement and motivation, making language learning more meaningful and enjoyable. Last year, our Assistants came to us from Nantes in France, Kiel in Germany, and Bogotá in Colombia. Feedback from the pupils has been particularly positive, and all of us, without exception, have enjoyed their input and expertise.

UK Linguistics Olympiad

The UK Linguistics Olympiad offers pupils a unique opportunity to explore the science of language through challenging and engaging problem-solving tasks. Sixth Form students competed in this prestigious competition for the first time in Autumn 2025. Two of our Upper Sixth Linguists, both of whom received offers to study Languages at the University of Cambridge, achieved silver (Seb Puddick) and bronze (Joe Galvin). Those currently in Years 11 and the Lower Sixth will be eligible to compete next year; watch out for announcements, and remember, this is not just for A Level linguists!

The Anthea Bell Prize

This national competition is run by Queen's College, Oxford, in the spring term each year, and was first established in 2021. It is named in honour of Anthea Bell, acclaimed translator of the Asterix comics and other literary works from French, German and Danish. Six languages are included in the competition: French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian and Mandarin. Competitors are given a text in the foreign language and must translate it into English. The texts can be poems, excerpts from novels or children's books, or non-fiction. Westcliff High School for Boys' pupils have enjoyed considerable success from the outset of this prestigious competition, with winners from the East of England, and nationally.

Have Your Say

This is a fun speaking competition where pupils compete in pairs against pupils from other schools in the East of England. We start to advertise this competition in January each year, with the finals taking place in May. Pupils in Years 7 to 9 must memorise and perform a dialogue, completing the last four lines themselves. There is a further element added in the finals; pupils must read aloud a new dialogue, which they can prepare for three minutes beforehand. In Year 10, pupils must write their own dialogue with a set scenario and using ten key words from a list of fourteen. The further element in the finals requires them to complete a separate dialogue under time constraints and to then read aloud the new dialogue before the judges.

Flash Fiction

The Faculty of Medieval and Modern Languages at the University of Oxford runs Flash Fiction Competitions in French, Spanish and German each year. Secondary school pupils are invited to submit a complete story of no more than 100 words, in French, Spanish, or German, for the chance to win up to £100. This is a

competition that we encourage pupils to enter, with deadlines usually in March of each year. Last year, we were delighted to learn that Muhammad Anwaar Ul Haq, then in Year 7, Kayden Miraflor, then in Year 8, and Habibur Kazi, then in Year 9, were highly commended for their German short stories.

The Stephen Spender Prize

From May to July each year, entries are invited to the Stephen Spender Prize, an annual competition for poetry in translation that celebrates the creativity of young people across the UK and Ireland, as well as their teachers. The prize has categories for schools, teachers and individual young people, and the School has enjoyed success in this competition in recent years. Each year there is a special 'spotlight' strand that focuses on a different widely spoken language. The spotlight language for 2026 is Polish.

Mother Tongue, Other Tongue

The Mother Tongue, Other Tongue competition is a multilingual poetry contest that celebrates cultural diversity and the range of languages spoken in secondary schools in England. Organised annually by Routes into Languages East in partnership with the University of Cambridge's Faculty of Modern and Medieval Languages, it invites students to either write an original poem in a language they are learning at school or share a story or poem from their mother tongue if it is not English. The competition encourages creativity, linguistic skills, and pride in cultural heritage, bringing together students from diverse backgrounds to celebrate the richness of languages. We have a good track record of success in this competition, with 29 shortlisted students last year, and 8 winners. Students should watch out for announcements regarding future competitions.



Football and Olympics Challenges

During great international sporting events, such as the Olympic Games, the Football World Cup, and the Africa Cup of Nations, the MFL Department puts on a week of lunchtime quizzes and summer holiday challenges to celebrate the languages spoken by the host nation or competing nations. Pupils should watch this space for AFCON 2027, and the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles in 2028!



MFL Trips

BFI trips

In the autumn and spring terms, Sixth Form linguists travel to the South Bank in London to attend a study day at the British Film Institute (the BFI). As part of the A Level course, students must study a film in the foreign language studied, and in the A Level examination, they write an essay where they analyse a particular aspect of the film. This could be about characters, themes or techniques. The study day at the BFI is conducted by a university lecturer in the language studied, with the opportunity for students to take part, answering questions as part of the audience, and focusing on different aspects of the film. In the afternoon, students watch the film on the big screen, giving them the opportunity to see the film as the director had intended it, i.e. in the cinema.

At Westcliff High School for Boys, we study *Au revoir les enfants* by Louis Malle in French, *El laberinto del fauno* by Guillermo del Toro in Spanish, and *Good Bye, Lenin!* by Wolfgang Becker in German. It is a very useful and enjoyable study day for our A Level linguists.

Almería

We are fortunate to have an excellent partner school in Almería, IES Albaída, and have collaborated on a number of penpal projects over the years. We have also visited Almería and Andalusia three times, taking nearly a hundred and twenty pupils in total over the three visits. We are delighted to be returning in February 2027 with a further thirty-five pupils. We spend a day with our friends at IES Albaída in their school, visit the theme park in the Tabernas Desert, explore the old city of Almería, with its Alcazaba, then visit the world heritage monuments of La Alhambra in Granada, the Mezquita-Catedral of Córdoba, and finish the trip with a visit to Seville and its cathedral and Plaza de España. More information will be shared in the next edition of *The Westcliff Diary*, prior to our February 2027 visit.





Paris

As outlined in our diary entry in this edition, the Modern Languages Department is looking forward to the forthcoming trip to Paris in October, an exciting opportunity for pupils from Years 9 to the Upper Sixth to deepen their understanding of French history and culture.

A central focus of the trip is the study of France during the Second World War and the cultural heritage of France. Educational visits to La Coupole, Les Invalides, the Château de Versailles and the Armistice Museum will bring French History vividly to life. Experiencing these sites first-hand allows pupils to move beyond textbooks, developing a deeper appreciation of the social, political and human impact of the war.

Combined with opportunities to practise language skills and explore cultural landmarks such as the Louvre and the Eiffel Tower, this promises to be a highly enriching and memorable educational experience.

Year 10 Language Leaders

Dual linguists in Year 10 are invited to become Language Leaders, and our able linguists take on roles as mentors and organise events for the Modern Foreign Languages Department. We are very grateful to this team of devoted and inspirational pupils for supporting younger pupils in their learning, and for organising and facilitating lunchtime events.

Mentoring and Support Sessions

Every lunchtime apart from Fridays, pupils in Years 7 to 10 are welcome to attend mentoring sessions to support them with their Modern Foreign Language queries and doubts. W9 is dedicated to Spanish mentoring, W27 is the German mentoring room, and W7 is the French mentoring room. Pupils often find it helpful to attend before a vocabulary test or to help them revise for an end of module assessment. Some pupils will be instructed to attend if they are falling behind in their learning. The mentoring is designed as support and the vast majority of those who attend find that it is very helpful.

The distribution of the Phase 1 Report marks the final opportunity to modify subject selections, thereby ensuring that all students have a combination of subjects that align with their interests and capabilities.

YEAR 7 PHASE ONE REPORT

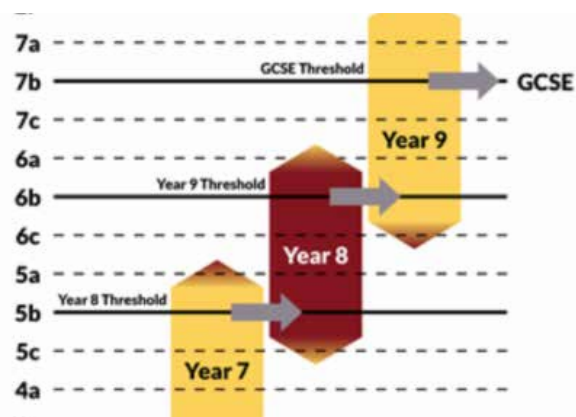
Friday 16 October 2026

On Friday 16 October, Year 7 will receive their Phase 1 (Baseline) Reports. These is an important report as it is the first indication for parents as to how their sons have adapted to academic study at the School. Parents will receive an initial indicator in the form of a grade from each of their sons teachers, using the School's internal grading system. As shown in the diagram, most pupils are graded 4a (developed performance), 4b (secure performance) or 4c (foundation performance) in the first half term. This helps parents, pupils and teachers to understand a pupil's current level of understanding, and identify areas of strength, and areas for development.

Once the reports have been issued, Form Tutors will dedicate time to support pupils in reflecting on their grades, and developing goals for the rest of the acadmic year. Form tutors will also discuss with pupils strategies to help them improve their grades where a foundation performance has been recorded.

Parents should discuss with their son the content of the report, and the goals set by him, which will be recorded in his planner. Should there be any further concerns, parents should contact their son's Form Tutor via the School Office. The Lower School Pastoral staff are also on hand to provide support where this is required.

YEAR 9 PHASE ONE REPORT

Thursday 22 October 2026

On Thursday 22 October, Year 9 pupils will receive their Phase 1 Reports. This represents an important milestone, providing a clear indication of how pupils have begun the academic year and informing the lead-up to GCSE options, which commence in January.

Each report includes a current attainment grade in every subject, based on the School's internal grading system. At this point in Year 9, the expected standard is 6a, with grades above or below this benchmark indicating performance relative to expectations. Pupils will also receive their Lower School target grade. The average target is 7b, meaning that pupils with higher targets would typically be expected to be performing above 6a, while for those with lower targets, achieving a 6a represents strong progress. This context allows parents, pupils, and teachers better to understand current attainment and to identify both strengths and areas for development.

The report also includes attitudinal indicators, graded on a scale from 1 (Exceptional) to 4 (Unacceptable), with 2 (Good) indicating the expected standard. A grade of 1 reflects performance exceeding expectations, while grades of 3 or 4 highlight areas where improvement is needed. Parents are encouraged to refer to the accompanying guidance for further explanation of these indicators.

Following the release of the reports, Form Tutors will support pupils in reflecting on their performance and setting targets for the remainder of the academic year. Where necessary, pupils will be guided in developing strategies to address areas of underperformance.

We encourage parents to review the report with their sons and discuss the targets set, which will be recorded in their Student Planners. Should you have any concerns, please contact your son's Form Tutor via the School Office. A range of support is available within the school, including pastoral care, subject-specific support, and mentoring, ensuring that all pupils are well supported in their progress.

The Strength & Conditioning Programme has continued to play a vital role in the development of WHSB's student athletes throughout the academic year. The programme is designed not only to improve performance in the short term, but also to build the physical foundations required for long-term sporting success.

Throughout the year, students have focused on developing strength, increasing muscle mass, improving athletic movement, and enhancing overall fitness. The programme has created an extremely positive training environment where students are challenged to improve and encouraged to take ownership of their development. Their performances throughout the group stages have been impressive, combining strong technical ability with resilience and teamwork. As a result of their outstanding efforts, the team has successfully progressed to the knockout stages of the competition. Several players have produced particularly notable performances, with Daniel Khan, Max Tuskin, James Packer, and Aarvin Khanka consistently contributing important wins and demonstrating excellent commitment and composure throughout the fixtures. The team has shown great promise for the future of tennis at the School and will look to continue their strong form as the competition progresses.

The Year 9/10 team has faced a far more challenging campaign, largely due to injuries affecting a number of key players. This has meant that the squad has had to adapt regularly, with frequent changes in team selection and pairings across fixtures. Despite these setbacks, players have shown determination and resilience, continuing to compete positively and support one another throughout the season. While consistency has been difficult to achieve, there have still been several strong individual and team performances, with the squad remaining competitive in a demanding group.

We are particularly grateful to the Headmaster for his continued investment in our athletics facilities. The development of the new jumping area represents a significant enhancement to our provision and will provide pupils with greater opportunities to refine their technical skills throughout the year. This investment will play a vital role in supporting future athlete development and ensuring WHSB remains competitive at county, regional, and national level.

The Borough Athletics once again provided an excellent opportunity for our athletes to showcase their talent. WHSB celebrated Borough Champions across every Year Group this year, highlighting the depth of ability within the School. A particular highlight was the Year 10 relay team, who were crowned 2026 Borough Champions following an outstanding team performance. These successes reflect the commitment of our students and staff, and provide an excellent platform as we continue to strive for success at the highest levels of school athletics.

Essex Schools Championships 2026

Following the Borough Athletics trials, fifteen WHSB pupils were selected to represent the City of Southend at the Essex Schools Championships, held on 13 June. This is a tremendous achievement in itself and reflects the exceptional standard of athletics within the School.

WHSB's athletes produced an outstanding set of performances across a wide range of events, particularly in the hammer, discus, shot put, triple jump, and 1500 metres.

Joshua Babalola (Year 11) and Taseen Ahmed (Year 9) were both crowned Essex Schools Hammer Champions in their respective age groups. In addition to winning their titles, both athletes achieved the English Schools qualifying standard and were selected to represent Essex at the English Schools Championships.

Ameer Salaam continued his remarkable consistency by retaining his Essex Schools Shot Put title for a second consecutive year, once again surpassing the English Schools qualifying standard to earn selection for the Essex team.

There were further outstanding performances from Nathan Moradeke-Johnson, who claimed the Essex title in the discus, George Riley, who secured an excellent silver medal in the 1500 metres, and Sochima Okoye, who produced a superb performance to finish third in the triple jump.

These results are a testament to the dedication, commitment and talent of our athletes and reinforce WHSB's reputation as one of the leading athletics schools in Essex.

Michael Kushimo was selected to represent Essex at the Regional Schools Combined Events Final, where he played an important role in helping the county secure the 2026 team title. Competing across five demanding disciplines — 100m hurdles, shot put,

javelin, high jump, and 1500 metres — Michael produced a series of outstanding performances to finish an excellent fifth overall against the strongest multi-event athletes in the region.

Looking ahead, several WHSB athletes have earned the opportunity to represent Essex at the prestigious English Schools Athletics Championships in Birmingham. Widely regarded as the pinnacle of schools' athletics in England, the championships provide our pupils with the chance to compete against the country's very best young athletes and, for those who excel, the opportunity to secure selection for the England Schools team and earn the honour of an England international vest.

On Thursday 18 June, the U15 cricket team competed in the Regional Finals Day at Old Parkonians Cricket Club. Their opening fixture was a semi-final against Moulsham High School, with the winner progressing to the Round of 64 in the Barclays Knights-Stokes Cup.

After losing the toss, WHSB was put into bat and endured a difficult start, losing a wicket with the second ball of the innings. The top order continued to struggle, leaving WHSB at 32/5 at the end of the powerplay. However, Year 9 pupils Nivain Jayawadana and Sanchit Shedbale produced an excellent recovery, both scoring over 40 runs to guide WHSB beyond 100. James Lewis (Year 10) finished the innings in style with a boundary, helping WHSB post a competitive total of 139.

WHSB's disciplined bowling and sharp fielding proved too strong for Moulsham High School, who fell short of the target. Wickets were shared between Druhvan Appachi (Year 10), Goutham Sanga (Year 9), Jash Dalal (Year 10), Sanay Hiremath (Year 9), and James Lewis (Year 10), while Sam Bharti impressed with an outstanding fielding performance.

In the final, WHSB faced Shenfield High School and, after losing the toss once again, were asked to bowl first. Despite strong bowling spells from Prajeen Raja (Year 10) and Sanay Hiremath (Year 9), along with excellent fielding from Akshoba Sathiamoorthy (Year 9) and Shri Gangireddy, Shenfield posted a challenging total of 184 from their 20 overs.

Chasing 185 for victory, WHSB made a confident start through an excellent opening partnership between captain Shri Vijaykrishan (Year 10) and Sai Vijay (Year 10), reaching 46/1 at the end of the powerplay. With 138 runs still required from 84 balls, the task remained difficult. However, captain Shri Vijaykrishan delivered an exceptional innings, scoring an unbeaten 105, including 10 fours and 4 sixes, to lead WHSB to a remarkable victory.

WHSB reached 185 in just 19 overs, securing the title of Regional Champions and progression to the Round of 64, where they will face Bishop's Stortford High School at Haileybury School.

Across the season, the team has played 10 matches so far, winning eight and losing two. At the time of writing the Borough Final is still to be played and we are looking forward to this match against Southend High School for Boys.

Several players have produced outstanding performances throughout the season. Captain Shri Vijaykrishnan has led his team from the front, opening the batting and scoring multiple half-centuries during the Essex Cup group stage, before producing an outstanding unbeaten 105 in the Essex Cup Final to guide his team to victory.

Other notable performances came from Jash Dalal and Goutham Sanga, who have each taken more than 12 wickets across the season.

The team has enjoyed a highly successful campaign, with 14 players representing the School throughout the season, ranging from Year 8 to Year 10. Highlights include reaching the National Cup Finals Day, topping the Essex Cup group stage before going on to win the competition by defeating strong sides in Moulsham High School and Shenfield School.

The return of the ever-popular Summer Reading Challenge also saw pupils in the Lower School rewarded for reading at least six books during the Summer Break. This year, we had a high number of participants and wish to congratulate all those who completed the challenge.

The end of last year also saw the appointment of a number of new volunteer Library Ambassadors, each of whom is responsible for a set shift each week. They help to issue, return and re-shelve books as well as help with any literary related questions their peers may have. Any pupils wishing to become a Library Ambassador are urged to keep an eye out for notices and announcements. Currently, we are particularly interested in recruiting members of the Sixth Form.

At the start of this academic year, we have been eagerly anticipating the arrival of students new to the Sixth Form, and the new Year 7 cohort. Pupils joining the School this term will receive an introduction to the Library during their first lesson with us. Like all members of our community, they are permitted to borrow up to six books at a time, for a duration of three weeks.

Another exciting event specifically for Year 7 pupils is the School's annual participation in the BookTrust's Bookbuzz Programme, which has been developed to

support schools in getting young people excited about reading. Giving all Year 7 pupils the chance to choose and keep a book from 16 specially selected titles, this is always popular with the pupils. Penmanship Club

The Library is also home to Mrs Oats' Penmanship Club. Pupils' handwriting is monitored by teachers across all subjects, and anyone considered in need of assistance is referred. During the Club's sessions handwriting is continually assessed, the aim being for the pupils to improve to a point whereby their attendance is no longer required.

Handwriting is of utmost importance as, although its quality is not assessed in public examinations, it is vital that all pupils' writing is legible, so their work can be read and marked correctly. If pupils do not improve enough, they will be asked to continue attending future sessions. We hope the pupils are finding these sessions supportive and helpful.

Lifelong Readers Initiative

All pupils at Westcliff High School for Boys take part in the Lifelong Readers Initiative in order to develop their intellectual curiosity, global awareness and to become more effective communicators. Research has proven that reading improves writing and comprehension skills, general knowledge and gives a better understanding of other cultures. Reading is also one of the most enjoyable and enriching hobbies and the aim of Lifelong Readers is to instil a love of reading for pleasure.

The titles chosen for each of Years 7, 8 and 9 are chosen because they are challenging and cover a variety of themes

and topics, also introducing new vocabulary and increasing reader confidence. They have been chosen to give an insight into other worlds and cultures, as well as giving pupils an understanding of and respect for the nine characteristics protected under the Equality Act 2010: Age, Disability, Gender Reassignment, Marriage/ Civil Partnership, Pregnancy/ Maternity, Race, Religion/Belief, Sex, and Sexual Orientation.

The books chosen are as follows:

- Spring Term: The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night by Mark Haddon
- Summer Term: I Am Malala by Malala Yousafzai

Year 8

- Spring Term: Boys Don't Cry by Malorie Blackman
- Summer Term: A Short History of Nearly Everything by Bill Bryson

Year 9

- Autumn Term: The War of The Worlds by H G Wells
- Spring Term: Frankenstein by Mary Shelley
- Summer Term: Touching the Void by Joe Simpson

These books are to be read during the classes' library lessons and Mr Northfield and Mrs Oats also devise quizzes about these texts to ensure understanding.

After studying at Middlesex University, I began my career with a focus on physical geography. Over time, however, I have become increasingly interested in human geography. I particularly enjoy teaching dynamic and ever-changing topics such as urbanisation and globalisation, which encourage students to think critically about how societies and places evolve.

I studied Geography at Durham University, where I carried out fieldwork on the River Wear, explored peat bogs in the Peak District, and examined coastal cliffs in Hull. My favourite place I have visited is Iceland – it is so different from anywhere else I have been, with incredible landscapes and scenery. My favourite topic to teach is the Water and Carbon Cycles at A Level. I enjoy how relevant it is to current global challenges, as it helps students to understand real-world environmental change and think about how we can manage these issues.

I took my Geography degree at the University of Manchester. The city in the 1990s was far from being the vibrant, energetic, and bustling place it has become today as a result of urban regeneration. I studied for a BA in Human Geography at Royal Holloway, University of London, where I developed a strong interest in how people interact with cities and environments. A particularly meaningful experience was my visit to Nicosia in Cyprus, the world's last divided capital city. Observing the physical and social separation between the Greek Cypriot south and Turkish Cypriot north brought human geography concepts to life, illustrating themes of political conflict, identity, and the impact of borders on everyday life.

Overseas adventures



One of the great aspects of Geography is that you get to see the world from the comfort of your school desk - from the frozen tundra of Alaska via the searing heat of the Arabian desert, to the sprawling megacities of Asia and the ocean trenches of the Pacific and beyond. However, it is even better when you get the chance to visit exciting locations firsthand and experience our World of Wonder.

The Geography and Geology Department has run a number of trips to unforgettable locations that participants have really valued. Our visit to Iceland showcased this incredible country's breathtaking volcanic, coastal, and glacial landscapes, its idiosyncratic culture, and its impressive hot springs. Our Norway adventure gave WHSB students a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to kayak along fjords, climb and explore a glacier as the winter snow started to set in, hike through beautiful waterfalls, and to experience this country's historic city of Bergen. While for those who prefer their weather hot and sunny, fieldtrips to Barcelona provided the perfect setting for exploring seasonal river valleys, vibrant culture, and astounding architecture.

Who knows where we will end up next? But do not forget, wherever you go on holiday with your family - whether to the UK or overseas - you are broadening your geographical knowledge and understanding. If you bring back a souvenir, maybe you could tell your Geography teacher about it or show it to your class?



Fieldwork

Exploring the world to enhance our understanding of it is a fundamental of Geography. Fieldwork offers pupils an opportunity to apply concepts taught in the classroom to real world contexts and to answer questions in a methodical manner, presenting data in both graphical and cartographical ways. It contributes to personal development by building confidence, teamwork, communication, and problem-solving skills and it helps students

understand physical and human geography through direct observation and investigation in places such as rivers, coasts, urban areas, and rural environments.

At Westcliff High School for Boys, there are various fieldwork opportunities throughout the School. Pupils in Year 7 spend the day in Southend examining physical coastal processes, looking for tourist attractions, including visiting the pier, and preparing for Year 8 by looking at urbanisation, for which study pupils will also

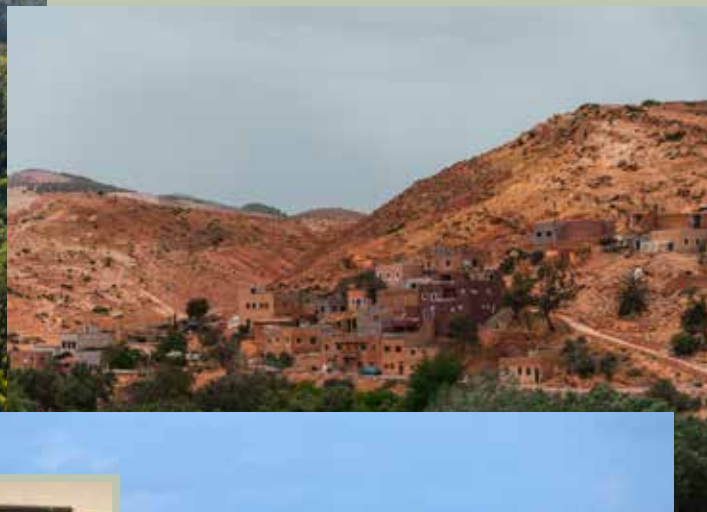
conduct research in their home area. In Year 9, pupils follow the enquiry approach to explore the School's microclimate. Fieldwork is an integral part of the GCSE course, and pupils study different urban environments (such as social inequality in Westcliff-on-Sea) and the interactions of people with their natural environment at Walton-on-the-Naze.

To support the preparation of the Sixth Form Geographers for their Non-Examined Assessment, they visit Belfairs Wood as a local ecosystem, and Brick Lane London to examine the

characteristics of a place. Geography A Level students frequently obtain outstanding results in their Independent Investigation coursework projects. Fieldwork develops important geographical skills, including data collection, analysis, mapping, and interpretation. Students learn enquiry skills by asking questions, investigating issues, and drawing conclusions based on evidence. These skills are transferable and support wider academic development.

Geography in the Headlines: How Year 9 Pupils are Connecting Classroom Learning to the Real World

At Westcliff High School for Boys, Geography is far more than maps and case studies; it is a subject that helps students make sense of the world around them. Geography sits at the very heart of many of today's most important news stories. In the summer term, a group of pupils from Year 9 were exploring this powerful connection through an engaging project linking current affairs to the Geography they study in the classroom.

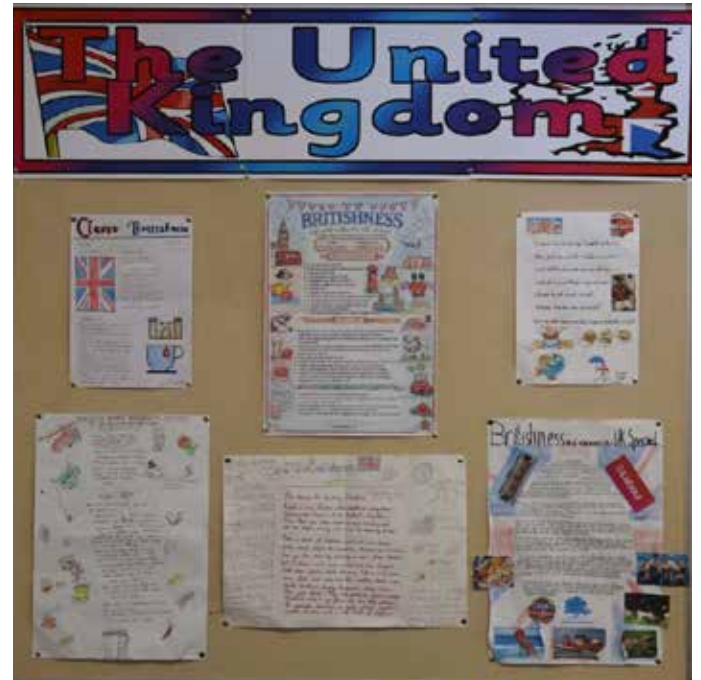
The project challenged these pupils to select a recent news article of interest and investigate the geographical concepts behind the story. The aim was not simply to summarise the news, but to dig deeper - to ask why events are happening, where they are happening, and how they connect to wider global patterns and processes.

One of the key learning points from the project was just how frequently Geography appears in the headlines. Many pupils initially assumed Geography-related news would be limited to natural disasters such as earthquakes or hurricanes. However, as they explored a range of media sources, it quickly became clear that Geography underpins a much wider variety of global issues.

This Year 9 project has highlighted the importance of Geography in helping all students become informed, globally aware citizens. By engaging with real-world issues, Year 9 pupils have developed a greater awareness of the challenges facing different parts of the world, as well as the interconnected nature of these challenges. Whether examining the impacts of deforestation in the Amazon, the causes of drought in East Africa, or the pressures of urbanisation in rapidly growing cities, students have seen first-hand that local events are often part of much larger global systems. Geography provides the framework to understand these links.

The success of the project demonstrates how powerful it can be to connect classroom learning with current events. Geography is not just about learning facts; it is also about developing the skills needed to interpret and respond to the world around us. As future challenges such as climate change, resource management, and population growth continue to shape our planet, the ability to think geographically will be increasingly important. The work of our Year 9 pupils shows that the geographers of the future are already beginning to engage with these issues thoughtfully, critically, and with a clear sense of curiosity.

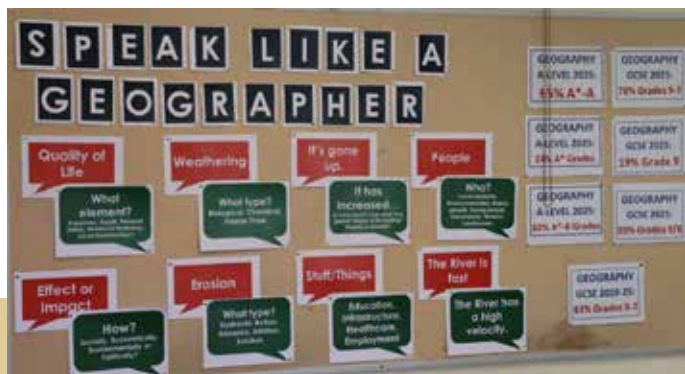

Membership of the Royal Geographical Society

It supports geographical research, education, and fieldwork and expeditions, as well as advocating on behalf of the discipline, supporting geographers in professional practice, and promoting Geography to public audiences. School Essay competition

Sixth Form students often take part in the School Essay competition run annually by the RGS. It is a great way to develop geographical knowledge and understanding and can be a useful addition to a UCAS application. This year's title is: What factors drive migration, how are patterns shifting and what are the consequences?

Virtual work experience

The RGS offers a free virtual work experience programme focusing on careers using geography. It introduces a variety of

organisations that employ geographers, and guides pupils through the range of jobs that professional geographers do across four themed modules: Hazards and risk in the real world; Shaping cities and communities; Sustainable resources; and mapping the world with GIS.

Young Geographer of the Year

The RGS also runs the Young Geographer of the Year competition. This year they are inviting students from Key Stage 3, Key Stage 4, and Key Stage 5 to show off what they know about rivers by creating a poster showcasing the processes that shape rivers, the features they create, and the many ways they are used by both people and nature.

School Member Lectures

The RGS also runs a series of lectures, including a series of School Member events, held at the home of the RGS in Kensington Gore, which we have been lucky enough to attend. Other lectures are streamed online too.

GCSE Geography mentoring and lunchtime revision quizzes

Studying Geography and Geology is about developing an interest and love for the world around us in all its glory, but focus often turns as well towards public examinations. In Geography, Subject Prefects pass on their friendly wisdom by supporting Year 11 pupils during lunchtime mentoring sessions in the Spring term. Similarly, in Geology GCSE pupils mentor their peers, teaching key ideas and helping to refine examination technique. As those GCSE examinations draw close, lunchtime revision quizzes in Geography provide pupils with another chance to test their knowledge (or to fill in any remaining gaps).

Going places with Geography

Geography particularly appeals to those students who like to get outside the classroom and see theory in action, but academic Geography is highly valued and helps to open doors to future careers.

Here, a few former WHSB students reflect on their time studying Geography at A Level and where they went to next.



**Sammy Joujou, Old Westcliffian
(2014-2021)**

Although I ultimately pursued a Mathematics degree at university, my passion for Geography never faded. In fact, I found a way to combine my two favourite subjects in my dissertation, exploring how the Lotka-Volterra model – typically used in population dynamics – could be applied to geographical systems. Fast forward to today, and I am working at Deutsche Bank in the Commercial Real Estate division. Here, the skills and understanding I gained from Geography are invaluable – each month, I assess the sustainability impact of our projects, a task directly rooted in the environmental and human geography I studied. Beyond technical applications, Geography was my only essay-based A-Level. This experience was instrumental in teaching me how to articulate complex ideas clearly and persuasively – a soft skill that is absolutely invaluable in any professional environment. Finally, my love for travel, sparked by exploring diverse cultures and landscapes in Geography, continues to be a driving force in my personal life, constantly enriching my understanding of the world. Even after five years of being away from Westcliff, Geography is definitely one of the subjects I look back on most fondly.



**William Brenton, Old Westcliffian
(2015-2022)**

I chose Geography at A-level because I enjoyed understanding how people, economies and environments are connected, and how global issues can affect everyday life. I was particularly interested in topics such as globalisation, superpowers, and the water cycle. Studying Geography helped me develop a range of transferable skills, including data analysis, research, problem-solving, and critical thinking. It also improved my ability to interpret trends, present information clearly, and work independently.

These skills have been valuable in my career, as I completed a degree apprenticeship at Visa and now work there full-time. In my role, I use these analytical and communication skills to help understand markets, consumer behaviour, and the wider economic factors that influence the payments industry and manage the relationships with clients.

My experiences of having studied Geography to A-Level fill me with nothing but great memories. Today, I am a year two student at Loughborough University, studying Urban Planning - a subject I would have never considered if it was not for the support and guidance of the Geography Department.

Whilst admittedly I chose Geography at GCSE purely out of my ability to identify flags correctly and play GeoGuesser, at A Level I was fortunate enough to be taught by four teachers who have had the greatest impact on my life so far, as they brought out my love for Geography. I learnt something new every lesson, and as a result would be excited to come into school, knowing I had Geography that day. Due to the support, guidance and enjoyment I got from Geography, I was able to achieve an A* at A-level and a 9 at GCSE, something I would not have believed if I had been told in the Lower School. I was able to transfer this passion into my further studies, where I ranked top of my cohort in my first year. If you are someone deciding whether or not to take Geography, at GCSE or A-level, I encourage you to go for it.



Lewis Norman, Old Westcliffian (2008-2012); Staff Member (2019-2025)

I first understood that I had a real interest in Geography during a Year 10 lesson at WHSB. I was given a blank world map and, rather than locate the required countries, I produced an annotated map of places I was interested in exploring. My teacher was not particularly

impressed with this but on reflection I think it perfectly demonstrates the intellectual curiosity and global awareness that WHSB strives to foster within all its pupils. I do not remember a time where I decided to study Geography at A Level because it was not really a question I had to ask myself – it was never in any doubt. That said, I was awarded the Speech Day Prize for Geography in 2010 and 2012, and I distinctly remember being motivated by the recognition of my hard work and enthusiasm for the subject from my teachers.

So where has Geography taken me now? After achieving my A Level in Geography, I went on to the University of Exeter, specialising in Glaciology and Biogeography. I then decided that I wanted to share my passion for the subject with young people, training to teach in 2016 and eventually returning to WHSB in 2019. My career has taken me to Shropshire, where I am now Head of Geography in an independent school – taking time to enjoy the glacially-sculpted landscapes of the West Midlands and North Wales.

Geography and Geology in Higher Education

Obviously, Geography and Geology are great subjects to study in their own right at School, but they are important subjects at university level too. It is not just degrees in Geology or Geography that are available; the subject content can play an important foundation within other degree subjects.

Land economy



The University of Cambridge Land Economy course is closely related to Geography because it combines the study of people, places, environments, economics, and law. It is an interdisciplinary subject that links many of the themes studied in both human and physical geography. The course can lead to careers in Urban planning; Property and real estate; Environmental consultancy; Law; Government policy; Sustainability and development; and many more. Here is a further reflection from a former WHSB student:

I remember Geography lessons at WHSB being some of the few that genuinely made you think across disciplines – economics, law, environment, policy all at once. That breadth stuck with me. I went on to read Land Economy at Cambridge, a course equally interdisciplinary by nature and which draws heavily on geographical thinking – specifically how land is used, valued, and contested in a changing world. Today, I am near completion of an MSc in Climate Change Finance and Investment at Edinburgh, focusing on renewable energy markets. It is a field that demands exactly the kind of joined-up thinking Geography first introduced me to, and I suspect that is no coincidence. It is clear to me, perhaps only after writing this reflection, that Geography has shaped the direction of my studies more than any other subject at school. I am not sure I would be where I am without it, and that is a wonderful thing to be able to say.

Earth Sciences



Earth Sciences degrees teach the evolution, composition, and future of the Earth and other planets. It merges physical sciences—such as physics, chemistry, and biology—with geology, palaeontology, and climatology.

Through studying both A Level Geography and Geology, my long running interest in these subjects has developed into a strong passion which has led to my decision to study Earth Sciences at university. Studying Geology has furthered my understanding of the mechanisms of Earth's natural environment, while Geography has given me a greater appreciation of how people interact with both the planet and each other. The knowledge I have gained has been well consolidated by studies in the field, including the geological history of the Isle of Arran and the characteristics of Prittle Brook, in our local area. The latter contributed to the hypothesis for my Geography coursework. The engaging content of the course combined with the continued support and enthusiasm of the teaching staff has helped me to obtain an offer to study Earth Sciences at Oxford.

Focus on Geology

Geology is a hands-on, multidisciplinary subject, integrating the sciences and mathematics, and I feel that is why it attracts pupils at WHSB. The fieldtrips have certainly been successful in attracting numbers and inspiring students to pursue it at university. I have been in the Department working with Mr Cooper for the past ten years and the results in that time have been excellent. In the past four years, the subject has been the best in School in three of those years, based on average point scores. More importantly, in the past two years the residual scores (comparing a pupil's achievement between their chosen subjects) have been the highest in the School, illustrating the commitment students have shown to the subject.

For many years, we ran a trip to Dorset to the Isle of Purbeck, which for some pupils was the first time they had visited the Jurassic Coast, an area of outstanding natural beauty with amazing geology. Lulworth Cove and Kimmeridge Bay are the two highlights of the trip, although Old Harry Rocks on day one is a hit for the geographers in the group.

At A level, notable successes in recent years have been the 2024 group who achieved 7 A* and 2 A grades. I taught some of these

students when they were in Year 7 and they had always been an outstanding cohort. The outgoing Upper Sixth group were also an incredibly hardworking and inspiring group to teach, and all wanted to read geology or a geology-related degree at university.

I feel the Scottish Isle of Arran trip plays a role in inspiring students to want to study the subject further. It is a world-class destination for geology, run by a committed group of people at the Lochranza Centre. The scenery is spectacular and if the wind is blowing long enough to keep the midges off you, then you can really enjoy the geology which spans some 600 million years. Highlights of the trip include the ferry ride from the mainland to Ardrossan, Hutton's Unconformity, Laggan, the spectacular Drumadoon Sill, Kildonan in the south of the Island, and the local wildlife – including an adder basking in the sunshine. A truly magical place to spend a week studying Geology.

Notable Oxbridge successes in recent years have included Stanley Upton (2018-2020), who read Earth Sciences at Oxford, Benedict Heath (2022-2024) Earth Sciences, Oxford; and Oliver Walker (2022-2024) Archaeology, Cambridge.

YEAR 8 PHASE ONE REPORT

Monday 9 November 2026



At this important point in the academic year for our Year 8 pupils, the Phase 1 Report will provide parents with a clear overview of how their son is progressing academically.

Using the School's internal grading system, the standard attainment grade for each subject at this stage is expected to be 5a, with grades above or below this indicating performance relative to that benchmark.

A Lower School target grade is also assigned, the average target by the end of Year 9 being 7b. Pupils with higher target grades would typically be expected to be performing above 5a, while for those with lower targets, achieving a 5a represents strong progress. This information helps to contextualise current attainment, and can be considered alongside the further detail, such as attitudinal indicators. Parents are encouraged to consult the explanatory guidance provided with the report.

Following the release of the reports, Form Tutors will offer further guidance to support pupils in setting meaningful targets for the remainder of the academic year. Where necessary, tutors will also work with pupils to develop strategies to address any areas of concern

We encourage parents to review the report with their son and discuss the targets set, which will be recorded in their Student Planners. Should any concerns arise, parents are invited to contact their son's Form Tutor via the School Office. A wide range of support is available within the school, including pastoral care, subject-specific support, and mentoring.

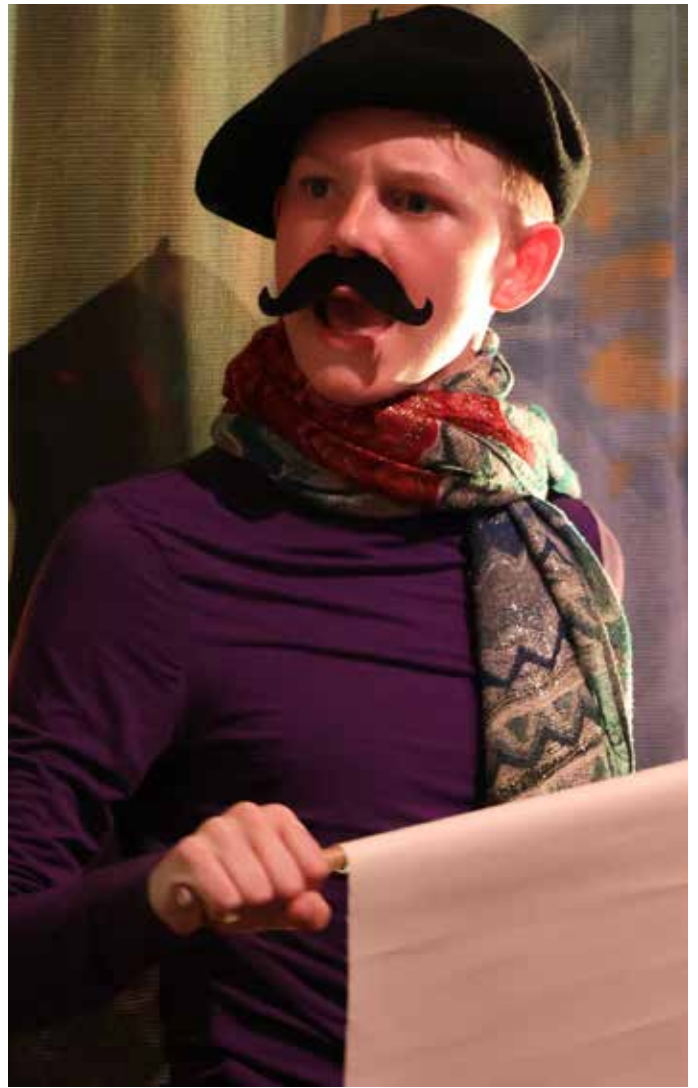

students who excel in Formative Assessments tend to achieve strong outcomes in their final A Level Examinations.

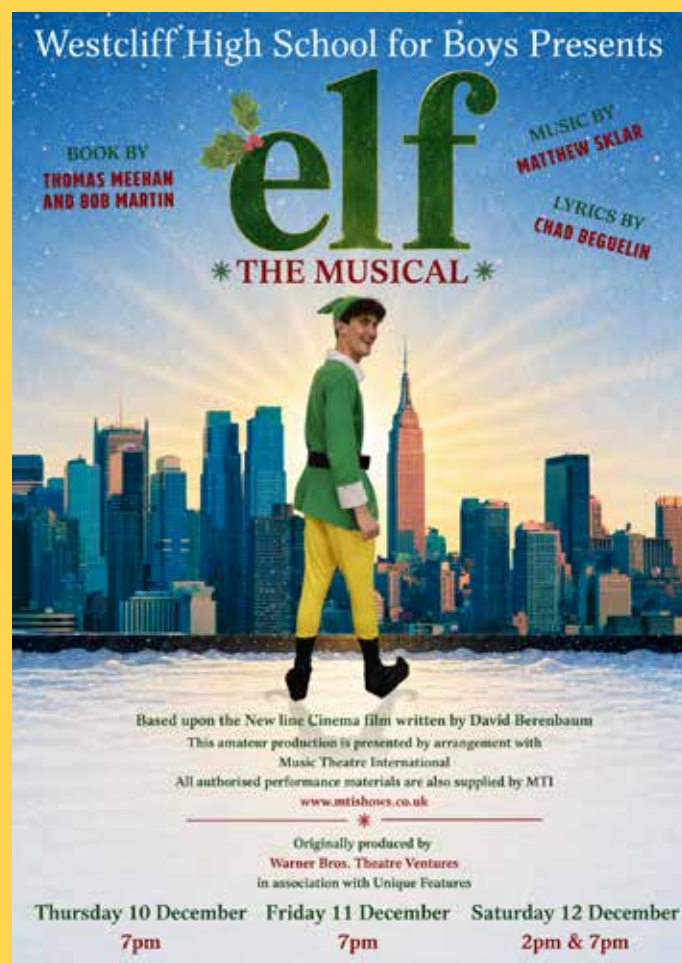

YEAR 11 GEOLOGY TRIP TO THE NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

Friday 11 December 2026

In December, Dr Shepherd and I will be taking a group of Year 11 Geology students to the Natural History Museum for a curriculum-focused visit. The Earth Galleries offer a range of exhibitions highly relevant to GCSE study, including *Visions of Earth*, *Volcanoes and Earthquakes*, *Restless Surface*, *From the Beginning*, *Earth's Treasury*, and *Hominid Evolution*.

Throughout the trip, pupils will complete a series of tasks linked directly to their GCSE course. These activities will involve identifying and describing a variety of rocks and minerals, examining evidence that supports plate tectonic theory, exploring surface processes involved in the formation of sedimentary rocks, recording recent volcanic and seismic events, and considering the role of geological resources in today's industrial world.

The Earth Galleries provide comprehensive coverage of the key topics within the GCSE specification, as well as extending pupils' understanding beyond the classroom. In addition, Westcliff pupils will have the opportunity to visit other areas of the museum, where they can explore the history of dinosaurs and learn about the origins of meteorites.
